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

SITE PLAN OF SINDH WILD LIFE MEUSEUM




































CITY CITIZEN AND SPACE

This ongoing project addresses the polemics of city, citizens and space. It explores how various sections of society interface with the city as a mosaic of architecture and open public spaces. Over time, architecture becomes heritage, whereas the public domain in and around it, is sadly ignored.

The project being presented by architects Christophe Polack and Asiya Sadiq Polack intends to provoke a discussion about the disconnect between the formal and informal heritage of Karachi. They want to advocate the need for comprehensive planning and policies which support a sustainable city through participation.

Their ongoing restoration project at the Sindh Wildlife Museum (SWM) site formerly the Free Masons Lodge, provides such an opportunity; as it lies at the tip of the cultural precinct of colonial Karachi.

Following an integrated approach, in addition to documenting the building they have documented through interviews the social history, the collective memories and identified the informal actors and processes which inform the public domain around the site. Archiving and integrating this information has required mediation, advocacy, negotiations and participation by all concerned.

The exhibit within the gallery space is reflective of an idea of constructed situations. The presentation of informative texts, biographies, memories and wish lists show a range of different approaches to the documentation and analysis of such an ephemeral project.

This project will continue across the three months of The Rising Tide, and visitors will be able to take part in a number of events/ walks / participatory gatherings. This process will be documented and taken back in to the gallery to engage visitors in the organic growth of the project. This approach to documentation erases the boundary between collaboration, event and reflection. Unlike traditional urban design schemes, this project is not about an end product, but a process of creating and thinking through a set of situations.

Asiya and Christophe belong to a generation of practitioners who have begun to engage more directly with specific social constituencies, and to intervene in participatory forms of address. This project presents a variety of positions that will allow students and researchers to think more widely about the implications of this impetus to participate.
